

# **GO-GURRIGULAR**



4th Class visited The Oireachtas to learn about our Parliament and it's history and buildings.



6th Class joined Aaron Crampton (a past pupil) who hosted a walking tour of our local area, focusing on the hidden history of Killester in relation to WW1 and WW2.

## KILMAINHAM GAOL

On Monday 20th March Mr McNamara and Mr Noone's 6th classes visited Kilmainham Jail for a fantastic tour exploring the rich history associated with this site. This account was written by boys from both 6th Classes.

The first area we visited was the court where prisoners were taken upon their arrival at the jail. We saw the stairwell that led to the holding cells where prisoners were kept before their hearings.

Next we went to the chapel and were shown a video of the history of the jail all the way back to the 1800s. We learned about the children who were housed in the jail for stealing food during Famine Times. We saw images of the destruction of Dublin city during the 1916 Easter Rising along with pictures of all the leaders. We were told all about the running of prison in the past. It was in this chapel that Grace Gifford and Joseph Mary Plunkett got married in the final hours before his execution.

Then we moved to the oldest corridor of the jail- the West Wing. These cells were made of limestone. This area was eerily cold and it was believed that ventilation kept the prison rid of disease. During Famine times this area was terribly overcrowded and women and children stayed in the corridor while the men were kept in the cells.

We visited the area known as the 1916 corridor. These are the three floors of cells which housed the leaders and other important figures of the 1916 Easter Rising. The landings were made of metal mesh so guards could see up and down between the floors. Countess Markievicz was kept here and we were told of her anger when she discovered she was not to be executed like the rest of the leaders due to her being a women.

Afterwards we got to see Parnell's Room - a more comfortable cell with a fireplace where leaders and prisoners sentenced to the death penalty spent their final hours. Grace Gifford got to stay here with James Plunkett for just ten minutes after their wedding.

We next moved to the East Wing. The first thing that struck us was the giant skylight which illuminated the whole wing. This was to remind the prisoners to look up to the heaven, reflect on their bad deeds and encourage them to make better choices before rejoining the outside world. The design of the wing allowed just one guard to keep an eye on the entire wing at all times. We also recognised the interior of the wing from the movie Paddington 2. We got to see Grace Plunkett's cell and we saw her mural of The Madonna.

Following this we went to The Stone Breakers yard- the area where prisoners were taken for exercise. This is also where the execution of the leaders of The Rising took place. A cross marks where James Connolly was executed from a chair due to his bad injures received during the Easter weekend.

Finally we got to the museum area where we saw a huge collection of artefacts that had been collected from The Rising, including a Thompson sub machine gun used by the British Army during the Rising, an original signed copy of the Proclamation read out by Pearse at the start of the Rising outside the GPO, a lock of Plunkett's hair which Grace Gifford kept and Grace's wedding ring.

This trip was memorable from start to finish. It gave us a deeper understanding and connection to this part of Irish history and gave us all a great sense of pride for the country we live in.
